

Alexander Laban Hinton serves as the Director of the Center for the Study of Genocide and Human Rights, Distinguished Professor of Anthropology, and UNESCO Chair in Genocide Prevention at Rutgers University. In 2011-2013, he served as the President of the [International Association of Genocide Scholars](#), and currently he serves as the [UNESCO](#) Chair in Genocide Prevention. Alexander Hinton has been the author and editor of over a dozen books, including, most recently, [It Can Happen Here: White Power and the Rising Threat of Genocide in the US](#) (NYU, 2021), [The Justice Facade: Trials of Transition in Cambodia](#) (Oxford, 2018), and [Man or Monster? The Trial of a Khmer Rouge Torturer](#) (Duke, 2016). In 2009, Hinton was awarded the Robert B. Textor and Family Prize for Excellence in Anticipatory Anthropology. From 2011 to 2013, Professor Hinton was also a Member/Visitor at the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton. In 2016, he served as an expert witness at the [Khmer Rouge Tribunal](#).^[1] Professor Hinton is also the co-convenor of the Global Consortium on Bigotry and Hate (2019-2024). At the moment, he is completing a book, "The Anthropological Witness," and his 2016 experience testifying as an expert witness at the Khmer Rouge tribunal in Cambodia.
